REPORT FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Reflecting and preserving the past is an important facet of furthering the organizational mission, but the ninetieth anniversary was, for Massillon Museum, future-focused. For one, a generous gift from Robert and Nancy Gessner challenged our community of supporters to match their \$90,000 endowment contribution. I am thrilled to report our community rose to the occasion.

meaning \$180,000 was invested into endowments at the Stark Community Foundation, helping ensure the continued maintenance of the property and longevity of the organization. Just as the Gessners took initiative to make transformational change, numerous other generous donors reflected their investment in helping MassMu succeed in areas of educational programming and exhibition development. A new kiln was purchased for use in the Frank Harrison Ceramics Studio by Nanette Ream who, after learning the twenty-year-old kiln was not firing properly, enabled the Museum to replace it. Karen and John Maguire presented an end-of-year contribution that supported production and corresponding programming for the Home Again: Embodiment of Africa through Art and Fabric exhibition. The individuals who made these donations recognized that investing now in the Museum is actually an investment in its future.

We completed several large-scale projects related to visibility that included a complete redesign of the Museum's website, funded by ArtsinStark, Massillon Community Charitable Fund, and Ohio Humanities. To help direct visitors to public parking in downtown Massillon on their way to MassMu, signage was installed at six locations throughout downtown in December. The project was funded in part by a Visit Canton Destination Enhancement Grant, and developed in partnership with Innis Maggiore and the City of Massillon.

Perhaps the largest project on which the Museum had been working over the course of 2023 was the self-study in preparation for the American Alliance of Museums Reaccreditation. This mark of distinction recognizes museums for their commitment to excellence, accountability, professional standards, and continued organizational improvement and alignment with best practices. The process requires museums

facilitate an in-depth, introspective evaluation of their programming, finances, governance, facilities, and collections management before having peer reviewers study a detailed report and conduct an onsite visit to recommend whether reaccreditation should be awarded.

Of roughly 33,000 museums nationwide, just under 1,100, or 3%, are accredited. Of the 3%, 21% have a staff size equivalent to that of MassMu's, and 18% reside in the Midwest. Massillon Museum has been accredited since 1972, and will learn of the AAM decision by early summer. Reaccreditation helps examine all facets of museum operations through a critical lens and inspires organizations to continually adapt and evolve for the benefit of serving the mission while engaging in best practices. It was through this critical lens the Museum made a decision in late 2022 to renovate the Aultman Health Foundation Gallery. After a four-month closure from late May to early September, the gallery was retrofitted with humidification control to yield more stable environmental conditions.

While these projects do not begin to scratch the surface of what all Massillon Museum tackled last year, they do reflect the ways in which we are made stronger by our supporters, the extent to which we strive for excellence, and our focus on the future. As you read other reflections throughout this report of what transpired in 2023, remember none of it would be possible without you, our members. Now, take a moment to reflect on how your support has played a role in the strong future of MassMu.

MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

Consider the Massillon Museum as host for your next meeting or event as a way to introduce friends and family to this organization, and to have the galleries at your disposal for special ambiance and built-in entertainment

You don't take a photograph, you make it.—Ansel Adams

Many Ansel Adams photographs can be enjoyed at the Massillon Museum; it is one of the numerous collections the Museum manages. Adams's photographs are intentional, purposeful, and unique. Most of his photographs are black and white, but vibrant, bold, and relevant. Adams helped transition photography from being thought of as a simple medium to one of fine art. He then used his artistic vision to preserve mother nature's most admired landscapes for generations to enjoy.

The Massillon Museum is a lot like Ansel Adams's photographs. The Museum may seem unassuming on the outside, but the mission and vision are intentional and purposefully designed to enhance the community and preserve its history. It is unique in the treasures it holds that reflect local heritage while resonating more broadly, like the Jewel Automobile and Paul Brown Museum collections, alongside national treasures like Adams's photographs, and even gifts from historical sites around the world. The Museum also owns internationally known collections like those featured in the *Moniker: Identity Lost and Found* exhibition (2018), which will be displayed in Amsterdam in spring 2024.

While the staff of the Museum are often found behind the scenes, they are the creators of the dynamic and bold displays that change frequently and make it a kind of work of art. The staff are constantly researching what other museums and galleries are doing to stay relevant and a leader in the museum world. The staff at MassMu have found a way to transform what could easily be an ordinary local museum into a center of excellence that is being recognized worldwide.

The Massillon Museum is more than a building; it is intentionally designed as a work of art for generations to enjoy.

Alexandra Nicholis Coon

Nicholis Coon is executive director for the Massillon Museum and holds a BA in art history from Kent State University, an MA in art history through the joint program at the Cleveland Museum of Art and Case Western Reserve University, and a Collections Care Certificate from

the Campbell Center for Historic Preservation. She has been with MassMu since 2001 and served as curator from 2003 to 2010. Coon served as board president for the Ohio Museums Association from 2017–2019, is immediate past chair for Visit Canton, and is active on boards of the Cleveland Print Room, Aultman Hospital, and Soroptimist International Midwestern Region. She has led two major capital projects for Massillon Museum, most recently a \$6.2 million expansion.



Scot Phillips

Scot Phillips, MassMu's operations officer, serves as membership coordinator, handles planned giving and donations, and leads the operations department. He came to the Museum as an intern in January of 2008. Phillips graduated from Kent State

University with a BA in art history and a minor in fine arts. He worked with Sandi Thouvenin—to whom he is now married. He serves on the Ohio Museums Association board and was president of the Downtown Massillon Association in 2021. Phillips has completed mural commissions for the cities of Massillon, Canton, Kent, Akron, Magnolia, and more. He was co-curator and project director of MassMu's award-winning Moniker: Identity Lost and Found exhibition and catalog. He and his wife are the parents of twins, Klara and Cooper.



Mandy Altimus Stahl

Archivist Mandy Altimus Stahl began her MassMu career in 2004. She graduated summa cum laude from Kent State University with a BA in history. Stahl has produced documentary works such as Massillon in the Great War, The Legacy of Steel, and The Greatest

Generation. She was the 2016 plenary speaker for the Society of Ohio Archivists, and in 2015 appeared on Travel Channel's Mysteries at the Museum. Stahl and her family published her grandfather's World War II POW memoir, Forced March: From the Bulge to Berchtesgaden by Major John J. Mohn. Her book, Early Massillon and Lost Kendal, was published by Arcadia Publishing in 2017. Stahl serves on the Spring Hill Historic Home board of trustees, and as treasurer for the Charity School of Kendal Foundation. In 2018, she was inducted into the YWCA Canton Women's Hall of Fame.



Stephanie Toole

Stephanie Toole, education and outreach manager, joined the Massillon Museum staff in June 2019. She plans educational programming for exhibitions; art and history classes; outreach; and special events. Toole organizes the Celebration in Art

K–12 student art exhibition and leads the NEA Big Read program and committee. She supports the Poetry Out Loud program and coordinator, and helps manage the Museum's involvement in the Artful Living and Learning Intergenerational Program. She is co-chair of the Museum's accessibility committee, an Artful Living and Learning advisory board member, and an Ohio Alliance for Arts Education board member. Toole earned a BA in history and psychology from Ohio Wesleyan University and an MA in history with a concentration in public history from the University of Cincinnati.



Bailey Yoder

Bailey Yoder joined the Massillon Museum staff in April 2018 as the curator of football heritage for the Paul Brown Museum. She holds a BA from the University of Mount Union and an MA from Youngstown State University. She oversees research and design of

exhibitions in the Paul Brown gallery and manages the Paul Brown Research Library in Memory of Bob Shiring, which houses the extensive Paul Brown and Massillon Tigers archives. Yoder has coordinated and designed the Paul Brown Museum and curated numerous exhibitions, as well as collaborated with outside institutions and private collectors on multiple projects. She currently serves on the Ohio Local History Alliance executive board and the Massillon Tiger Football Booster Club Junior Board.



Emily Vigil

Emily Vigil is Massillon Museum's Studio M and Fred F. Silk Community Room Gallery coordinator. She earned a BFA in painting from Marshall University and an MFA in painting and drawing from Louisiana State University. She joined MassMu's staff

in 2009, after working as gallery coordinator for the West Virginia Division of Culture and History, teaching as an adjunct at several universities, and directing the Birke Art Gallery in Huntington, West Virginia. In addition to her job at the Museum, she is a practicing artist and teaches visual art to preschoolers as part of the Artful Living and Learning program. She has two daughters, Madelyn and Gillian, ages thirteen and eleven.



Brandon Rohrer

Brandon Rohrer, who joined the Museum in March 2016, serves as guest operations manager, operating as the security liaison, guest services manager, manager of the Museum's shop, OHregionalities, and as a network administrator. Rohrer helped to found

and currently co-chairs the accessibility committee. He serves as director of technology and treasurer at St. John's United Church of Christ. He previously worked as assistant facilities manager at the McKinley Presidential Library and Museum and continues to assist as a planetarium presenter. He serves on the boards of the Massillon Heritage Society, Art Possible Ohio, and United Way Young Leaders Society. Rohrer spoke at the Ohio Museums Association 2020 and 2023 annual conferences. He studies information technology and business at Kent State University.

Anna E. Young, administrative assistant and social media manager, joined MassMu in 2019. She holds an MFA in photography from Cranbrook Academy of Art and a BFA in photography with a minor in printmaking, art history, and professional photography from

the University of Akron. She is the co-founder of KINK Contemporary, an artist-run art gallery in Cleveland's Waterloo Arts District. Young is also an assistant lecturer at the University of Akron, Myers School of Art, in the 2D Design department. Christopher Craft

Christopher Craft, program and exhibition specialist, graduated from the College of Wooster and holds an MA from the University of Akron. He taught art at Fairless Schools and was inducted into the Fairless Hall of Honor. He facilitates History Group, installs

exhibits, presents for the speakers' bureau, and serves on the collections committee. Craft co-developed and directed the Artful Living and Learning program, and serves on the advisory board. He participated in hundreds of Civil War living history events, several films, and two presidential inaugurations. He commanded two national organizations, belongs to the Order of Kentucky Colonels, and served on the board of directors of Accuracy Productions for the History Channel's Civil War Journal. Craft's artwork is in the collections of Kent State University, the University of Akron, First Ladies National Historic Site, and the White House. 
and is thrilled with the opportunity to work with the Massillon Museum in creating a show for Stark County residents.

VELMA B. ERWIN RESEARCH ROOM & ARCHIVES/ PERMANENT COLLECTIONS

During our American Alliance of Museums reaccreditation self-study, several volunteers and staff were tasked with counting the entire permanent collection and archives. More than 34,000 artworks and historical artifacts along with more than 1.5 million individual archival documents, photographs, and negatives are preserved in the Museum's permanent collections. MassMu thanks volunteers Amanda Perry, Susan and Josh Nason, Kristin Kessler, Christine Bowman, Mary Jane Corwin, and Essam Farrah for assisting with enumerating these treasures.

The collections team has been busy scanning and photographing more than 12,000 historical ledgers, documents, news clippings, and photographs. We currently have more than 27,000 images available through our virtual archive: MassillonMuseum.org/ VirtualArchives.

We added to our physical and virtual archive for the *Missing History of Massillon: Unheard African American Stories* project. With nine additional video interviews conducted this year, we now preserve forty-three hours of audiovisual content. We have created more than 160 clipping and subject files and scanned more than 4,000 photographs, newspaper articles, and documents. While we are still researching, editing videos, and processing scans, there are already several hours of interviews and thousands of artifacts to view online. Curator of Football Heritage Bailey Yoder has been working closely with members of the Massillon Tiger Football Booster Club on various projects—researching former players, organizing the collections, inventorying the Annual Football Booster Club Banquet drinking glasses, and researching to update the Studer Binder Collections. Two new volunteers to the Paul Brown Museum Collections are Eris Moesle and Essam Farrah. Moesle has been digitizing the Studer Binders, and Farrah assisted Yoder with counting, inventorying, and organizing the collection for the American Alliance of Museums reaccreditation self-study. Yoder developed inventory sheets to record a thorough description of items in the Paul Brown Museum collection.

PAUL BROWN MUSEUM EXHIBITIONS

Three exhibitions opened in the Paul Brown Museum this year. *Tigers vs Bulldogs: Origins of a Historic Rivalry*, which opened on February 11, explored this history of the professional team rivalry between the Massillon Tigers and Canton Bulldogs at the turn of the twentieth century and its influence on the high school teams. Also included in the exhibition were examples of fan fashion and sideline attire of players. *Tigers vs Bulldogs* was on display until July 2. *Massillon Faithful*, a student-curated exhibition by Walsh University intern David Maxwell, opened in April. This exhibit pays homage to the Massillon community and its passion for the Tigers football program. On July 29, *A Way to Win: Paul Brown's Innovations* opened as the fall/winter exhibition in the Paul Brown Museum. It focused on the legendary coach's inventions and contributions to modern football. *A Way to Win* closed on January 7, 2024. On November 30, the Massillon Tigers won their first state football championship title since 1970. To commemorate that achievement, the artifacts in *Massillon Faithful* were switched out with those representing the community's dedication to the team and the program. These will be on display through the first half of 2024.

During football season, several media outlets covered the fall/winter exhibition. On Friday, August 18, Yoder and Massillon Tiger Football Booster Club volunteers hosted a film crew from ITG Next in Valdosta, Georgia. They captured sites downtown, Paul Brown Tiger Stadium, and the Paul Brown Museum. Charita Goshay from the *Canton Repository* and a film crew from Amazon Prime's *Thursday Night Football* came in December to record for a spot during the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns football game. Throughout this flurry of activity, many visitors enjoyed the exhibitions.

Celebration in Art

The 2023 Celebration in Art exhibition opened on Sunday, February 5, with an in-person reception for the featured students, their art educators, and their families. The young artists all attended public schools in Western Stark County and were in kindergarten through twelfth grade. The exhibition featured nearly 220 two- and three-dimensional artworks. Twenty-four schools participated: Amherst Elementary, Edison Middle School, Fairless Elementary, Fairless High School, Fairless Middle School, Franklin Elementary, Genoa Elementary, Jackson High School, Jackson Memorial Middle School, Lake Cable Elementary, Lohr Elementary, Massillon Washington High School, Perry High School, Pfeiffer Intermediate School, St. Mary School, Sandy Valley High School, Sauder Elementary, Strausser Elementary, TC Knapp Elementary, Tuslaw Elementary, Tuslaw High School, Tuslaw Middle School, Watson Elementary, and Whipple Elementary.

Accessible Expressions Ohio

Accessible Expressions Ohio was on view from March 25 through May 7, 2023. Produced by Art Possible Ohio, the state agency on art and disability, the adjudicated, statewide exhibition and tour of art included the creative work of sixty Ohio artists with physical or mental disabilities. By touring the exhibition throughout the state in inclusive settings like MassMu, the agency and artists are given extended visibility, and a greater awareness about disability is yielded.

Artists were given the option to submit artwork in a special category—family—one of the themes

represented in the 2023 Massillon Museum NEA Big Read, which focused on the book *Interior Chinatown* by Charles Yu. A public reception was held concurrent with the NEA Big Read Kickoff. ANC

John W. Carlson: Set the Twilight Reeling

Massillon Museum staff endeavored to edit the prolific career of Clevelander John W. Carlson (1954–2020) to the comparatively small selection of artworks included in the exhibition. Set the Twiliaht Reeling. which opened September 16 and closed November 12, 2023. It was merely an introduction to the complexity of Carlson's artistic life. Visitors encountered videos, sketchbooks, and items from Carlson's studio to communicate his intention, thought process, and working environment. The studio recreation and objects within functioned as the record of a process. Rather than include outside interpretations of his artwork, the exhibit labels contained guotes from his own writings to illuminate the context. Although not present in person to experience audience responses and people responding to one another in this space, the spirit in which Carlson created, and lived, was alive in the gallery. It celebrated all the ways he was engaged with the human form to reveal the human condition. sourcing personal and shared experiences.

The full-color, eighty-page exhibition catalog served as a companion to the exhibition. It was more than a collaboration between Museum staff, artists, arts professionals, collectors, and gallerists. It was a labor of love. To explore facets of Carlson's artistic style and his influence on the regional art canon and arts

community in Northeast Ohio, as well as to illuminate the universal quality of his artwork, the exhibition catalog featured essays contributed by Theodore Wilkins-Lang, Shari Wilkins, Ruddy Roye, and Sabine Kretzschmar, along with Museum staff members.

Stark County Artists Exhibition

The 2023 Stark County Artists Exhibition opened Thursday, November 30, and ran through January 14, 2024. The call for entries received 221 submissions. by ninety-one artists, of which seventy-two artworks by fifty-one artists were accepted. Several artists who submitted this year were new entrants, including the artist who received Best in Show. This year's jurors were Cleveland artist Davon Brantley; Melissa Stallard, Associate Professor and Photography Area Coordinator at the University of Akron; and Steve Mountz, artist/art instructor from Salem, Ohio, In addition to making selections, they also assigned the prizes, which were awarded to Jessica Morton for bare feet (Best in Show); Judi Krew (Second Place) for Nap-caftan; and Bruce Stebner (Third Place) for Empty Table, Filtered Light. During the course of the exhibition, a total of 675 votes were cast for the annual People's Choice Award, and the winner was Brian Robinson for his painting, First Morning. AND

CONTEMPORARY ART GALLERIES

Studio M is MassMu's designated space for celebrating contemporary art, designed to exhibit artwork in all media. The Fred F. Silk Community Room Gallery is dedicated to collaboration with area partners. Often the Silk Room Gallery focuses on student artwork, while Studio M mainly exhibits artwork by well-established artists. However, in 2023, both exhibition spaces displayed professional and student artwork. Studio M's exhibit schedule included solo shows by two Cleveland Institute of Art students, while the Fred F. Silk Community Room Gallery's lineup featured three professional artist group exhibitions.

All of the Studio M and Fred F. Silk Community Room Gallery exhibitions in 2023 offered an opportunity for dialogue about human experiences. Each of the artists expressed their perspectives through skillful manipulation of their chosen art media.

Studio M

Studio M's 2023 gallery schedule began with two student exhibitions. First, Jordi Rowe's large-scale paintings filled the gallery from February 4 through 26. Rowe, a recent Cleveland Institute of Art graduate, was featured in an interview on WKYC's Good Company, alongside Studio M Coordinator Emily Vigil. The Cleveland TV show highlighted Rowe's exhibition, In the Gloaming. A second Cleveland Institute of Art student, Alison Alsup, shared her brightly colored and detailed watercolors in Prairies to Peaks: Biking to Colorado's Tallest Mountain. It was on display from March 11 through April 2, 2023. Davon Brantley's exhibition, Awaken in the Garden My Love (April 15 to May 28), transformed Studio M by incorporating light,

sound, sculpture, painting, and drawing to portray shadow "selves" and their relationships with the "seven deadly sins." From June 10 through July 23, Studio M presented Sarah C. Blachette: All Shook Up. The Detroit-based artist showed her giant printed and draped textiles along with mixed-media collages. tackling the transitory nature of memory. Next, Hilary Gent's exhibition. Waters of Motherhood (August 5) through September 17), filled the gallery with colors inspired by Lake Erie, reflecting the ever-changing cycles of motherhood. Ish Ishmael's lens-based gallery installation was called Manifestations of the Dystopian Reverie and was shown in Studio M from September 30 to November 12, 2023. Ishmael's exhibition portraved images of people from many walks of life in various locations throughout the country. The installation was an intense experience for viewers, juxtaposing different perspectives and worldviews through printed photographs and moving images on multiple screens. The final 2023 Studio M exhibition presented ink drawings and watercolors by Elena Masrour. Her exhibition, Bingo, I'm the King Now! (November 30, 2023, through January 14, 2024) featured artwork that addressed common struggles in Masrour's home country, Iran, using a critical stance. The heroines pictured in Masrour's artwork symbolized empowerment and resistance. FV

Fred F. Silk Community Room Gallery

The perspective of young artists is vital to share with visitors; the gallery's exhibition schedule began and ended with all-student exhibitions. *My Community: Through the Eyes of the 21st-Century African American Child: The Art and History of Soul Food was sponsored by the Kent Area (OH) Chapter of the Links, Incorporated, and was displayed from January 21 through March 19. The exhibition received a First Place Programming Award from the Central Area of the Links. Incorporated.*

Finding Identity: Heritage as Inspiration showcased regionally and nationally known artists Aimee Lee, Chi Wong, and Jordan Wong. The exhibition, guest curated by Tim Arai, was part of MassMu's 2023 NEA Big Read and connected with Interior Chinatown by Charles Yu. NEA Big Read is a program of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with Arts Midwest. The exhibition continued in the Flex Gallery on the second level of the Museum and was displayed from April 1 through May 21.

Several other 2023 Silk Room gallery group exhibitions also presented mid-career artists. From May 27 through July 30, *Up to the Challenge* included artwork by artists in the Canton Artist League. The Artists of Group Ten (based in Kent, Ohio) exhibited their artwork in *Ten Point Perspective*, on display from August 12 through October 15.

Finally, 2023 closed with *Artwork by the Boys and Girls Club of Massillon* (October 28, 2023, through January 17, 2024), an annual showcase of student artwork in a variety of art media.

JUDITH PAQUELET NATIVE AMERICAN GALLERY

Massillon Museum is deeply honored to offer artistic and culturally rich exhibits of artifacts from the Native American collection entrusted to its care. Exhibitions will rotate through the gallery periodically and will include selected artifacts created by cultures from Canada to Central and South America, and from Louisiana to Alaska. Spanning periods from 13,000 years ago to modern times and will illustrate imagery and craftsmanship that depict the expertise of Native American artistry and the abstract symbolism that describes their deep relationship with the natural world that is the center of their lives, cultures, and spiritualism. The first exhibition, *First Peoples of North America*, opened on January 12, 2023.

In early 2024, newly-issued regulations pertaining to the 1990 Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) stipulate museums must secure the consent of lineal descendants, Native American tribes, or Native Hawaiian Organizations before exhibiting their cultural objects. MassMu will continue its work in this area with regard to the exhibition and interpretation of related objects in its collection.

The Native American Gallery is dedicated to, and bears the name of, Judith Paquelet, a registered nurse and a longtime volunteer and board member of the Massillon Museum. She was very deeply interested in the history and cultures of Native Americans. Part of her many years volunteering at the Museum included working with the permanent collection, interpreting imagery, researching individual cultures, and creating exhibits. The Museum is proud to dedicate this gallery to her honor and service.

EDWARD AND LOUISE MAHONEY FAMILY GALLERY

The current exhibition, *Ethiopian Expedition of 1903*, features artifacts and images acquired as gifts from Ethiopia's Emperor Menelik II (1844–1913).

President McKinley charged his friend Robert Peet Skinner (1866–1960) of Massillon with a mission to Ethiopia, then known as Abyssinia. After McKinley's assassination in 1901, President Theodore Roosevelt renewed Skinner's charge to open trade and diplomatic relations between Ethiopia and the United States. Skinner traveled with a detachment of United States Marines and Massillon residents Horatio Watson Wales, who served as secretary, and Dr. Abraham Per Lee Pease, who served as the mission's medical doctor. PHOTOGRAPHY GALLERY

In September 2023, MassMu opened a new exhibition in the Photography Gallery, *Precarious Legacies: Exposures of a Fleeting Landscape.* This exhibition focuses on the conversation of environmental preservation through photographic images created by Ansel Adams (1902–1984) and Nell Dorr (1893–1988). It showcases the beauty of the natural landscape with the intention of inviting dialogue about climate change and what actions are necessary to preserve these landscapes.

OPEN STORAGE

Visitors never get to see many interesting and beautiful artifacts that have been accumulated into the public trust. Museums have turned to open storage exhibits over the last few decades as a creative way to display a wider selection of artifacts for their guests.

Open storage exhibits are designed to increase access to the collections, while additionally relieving the pressure of ever-expanding collections that outgrow available storage space. More than 30,000 artworks and historical artifacts along with more than 1,500,000 individual archival documents, photographs, and negatives are preserved in the Museum's permanent collections. Due to gallery space limitations, only one percent of the collection is on display at any given time.

Massillon Museum is pleased to honor the many requests by members and guests to view more artifacts from the collections. MassMu's first open storage exhibit showcases a selection of its international ceramic and glass collection.

EDUCATION & OUTREACH

MassMu staff interacted with more than 23,000 children and adults in Stark County and beyond through virtual and in-person field trips and tours, classes and workshops, and outreach programs in 2023. Community members of all ages enjoyed a variety of programs, from yoga and drawing classes to writing circles and ceramics workshops. We had the pleasure of interacting with community members throughout Northeast Ohio at outreach events during the year, including resource fairs, Fun Fest, community open houses, and First Fridays in the Downtown Canton Arts District.

Do the Mu, a free family-friendly art activity held on the first Saturday of each month, offered opportunities for attendees to learn about making cartoons, self-worth artwork, origami, weavings, watercolors, paper koi fish, painted garden stones, pipe cleaner monsters, masks, air-dry clay trinket dishes, and clothespin puppets.

Massillon Museum works to provide accessible educational programs to all community members in Massillon and Stark County and to engage in a wide range of events in our region. ST

2023 NEA BIG READ

The Massillon Museum was honored to receive the NEA Big Read grant for the sixteenth consecutive year. The community read *Interior Chinatown* by author Charles Yu, a screenplay-style novel that won the 2020 National Book Award for Fiction. The Massillon. Museum and Massillon Public Library partnered with community organizations, schools, and businesses, including Massillon City Schools, Art Possible Ohio. MotivAsians for Cleveland, Kent State University, the KSU Downtown Gallery, Soroptimist International of Canton/Stark County, Stark County District Library, BeYoutiful Weirdo, and Women's Impact, to host in-person and virtual programming related to Yu's book. People of all ages participated in programs such as book discussions, a screenwriting workshop, one-act plays, an artist panel, and a poetry read-in.

The Museum and Guest Curator Tim Arai developed the original exhibition *Finding Identity: Heritage as Inspiration*. The exhibition featured artwork by Asian



American artists Aimee Lee, Chi Wong, and Jordan Wong, and was on view in the Fred F. Silk Community Room Gallery and in the Flex Gallery from April 1 through May 21, 2023.

MassMu hosted author Charles Yu as the live virtual keynote speaker on April 27. Yu also spoke with Washington High School Honors English students at the Museum during a question-and-answer session earlier that day. More than one hundred Washington High School students read *Interior Chinatown* in their English classes. Younger students read complementary titles as part of the Little Read sponsored by One Tiger, Inc., and Massillon Rotary Foundation.



ARTFUL LIVING & LEARNING

It has been eighteen years since Wilbur Arnold and Chris Craft began to discuss the role of the arts in education and in society, the first step on a rewarding journey leading to the establishment of the Artful Living and Learning program (ALL). The Massillon Museum was the founding institution of the ALL program and remains involved today. ALL, an early learning. arts immersion program, provides weekly lessons to preschool children in music, dance, drama, and visual art throughout the school year. Implementing a pilot project in the preschool classroom of Kristi Muzi of Massillon City Schools in the spring of 2009, the program has enjoyed unqualified success. During the present school year, ALL employs twenty-four teaching artists, providing arts lessons to preschool classes in twenty-four public school districts in Stark, Carroll, and Tuscarawas Counties. Children receive one class. weekly in each of the four arts, from October through April to stimulate creativity and improve academic achievement for more than two thousand children each week. The program is now ably directed by Michele Waalkes through the Stark County Educational Service Center. MassMu remains active by holding two seats on the advisory board and organizing. acquiring funding, and hosting one of ALL's new intergenerational classes. This innovative application partners Massillon preschool children with Danbury Senior Living Center residents in a dance and movement class. The results of these classes are far deeper than the obvious physical and social stimulation. During the series of classes that the children and senior citizens share, a caring attachment develops among them as well as a growth in mutual understanding of one age group for the other. cc

ART EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

The Massillon Museum partnered with the Canton Museum of Art to present the fourth annual Art Educator of the Year Award in 2023. Nominees were licensed art educators in a K–12 public, private, or parochial classroom setting located in the region served by the Stark County Educational Service Center.

The five finalists were recognized during a joint ceremony on March 5 with the Canton Museum of Art and Canton Symphony Orchestra, which presents the Music Educator of the Year Award:

Congratulations to Tam Grandjean, Art Teacher at Hoover High School in North Canton City Schools, who was named the 2023 Art Educator of the Year!

Each finalist for the 2023 Art Educator of the Year Award submitted two artworks created either by themselves or their students for the *Art Educator* of the Year Award Finalists exhibition. One artwork representing each finalist was displayed in the Museum's Lower Level Lobby from March 21 through April 8. The Canton Museum of Art displayed a complementary exhibition of artwork created by finalists or their students during the same time.



POETRY OUT LOUD

The Massillon Museum wrapped up its first year as the Ohio Arts Council's Northeast Ohio regional partner and quickly began working on year two. A partnership of the National Endowment for the Arts, Poetry Foundation, and the state and jurisdictional arts agencies, Poetry Out Loud (POL) is a national arts education program that encourages the study of great poetry by offering free educational materials and a dynamic recitation competition to high schools across the country.

Emily Gordon from Stage Left Players was named 2022–23 Northeast Ohio POL Regional Semifinalist. She competed at the State Finals in Columbus on March 10, 2023.

The Northeast Ohio Regional Semifinals for 2023–24 were held at the Museum on November 11. Tamia Christian from Cleveland Heights High School was named Northeast Ohio POL Regional Semifinalist. MassMu's Poetry Out Loud Coordinator, Mary Ruth Kamp, helped her prepare for the state finals, in Columbus on February 9, 2024. A spooky soiree was held as a fun way to close in on the end of MassMu's ninetieth anniversary. On October 7, attendees came disguised as an array of characters and competed for costume awards while perusing the galleries and partaking in a number of activities. Tarot readers, live music by Big Pop, a burlesque show performed by Divine Harmony, and more were part of the entertainment.

Rhythms

With the help of funding from Visit Canton, the Museum revitalized its Rhythms concert series after a long hiatus. Coordinated by Dan Kane, the three-concert series kicked off in May with a sold-out homecoming show for Massillon-native Patrick Sweany. June 15 featured the HiFis, Anya van Rose, and the Bizarros for a high-energy evening of rock and pop. Cleveland blues artist Austin Walkin' Cane returned to MassMu for his third appearance on September 28. With opener Cody Martin, the show complemented the John Carlson exhibition. Triad Deaf Services provided ASL interpretation for all three events, which were held in Gessner Hall.

MEMBERS' HOLIDAY PARTIES

The Massillon Museum hosted members' parties for children and adults last year, starting with the Pumpkin Patch Party on October 11. Trick-or-treating around the galleries and games were among the fun activities. The costumes ranged from bumblebees and Batman to cowboys and zombies. The annual Members' Holiday Party on December 2 was attended by 150 of our supporters. Decorations inspired by an evergreen forest theme provided a backdrop to a festive evening. as did refreshments and entertainment provided by a Canton Symphony Orchestra trio. On December 6, children gathered again for the annual youth holiday party. Sweet treats, holiday crafts, and music filled Gessner Hall with holiday spirit. Following the party. children and families were invited to visit Santa's Cottage in Duncan Plaza to cap the jolly evening. ANC
